# Social Studies Lesson Plan

Unit of Study: Community - People Working Together
Big Idea: Interdependence
<u>Teaching Point:</u> Resources found in an environment affect the needs and look of a community.
Common Core Standards Addressed:

On Community: Discussion of needs and wants of our community, How do we
meet our needs?, Concepts of Shelter; Community Helpers, Transportation, Laws, Communication, Money, Health and Safety, and last Thursday, Introduction to Key Words: Interdependence and Resources
On Primary Sources: What is a primary source?, Habits of Historians, Exploring
UCLA Lab School's History through primary sources
Teaching Method:  think aloud/read aloud/modeling  guided practice X_ Inquiry  explain and give examples
Materials Needed: Photos of different communities, Thinking about Primary Sources forms, Thinking Maps for whole class recording of ideas

## **Workshop Lesson Format**

### Connection:

We have been thinking like sociologists and historians to look at communities. We looked at old black and white photos that we discovered were taken here over 50 years ago and more. We practiced the habits of the historian and explored all the parts that make a community work. Now we are starting to explore different kinds of communities. Think back to the 4 photos we investigated last week. What did you notice?

#### Teach:

Today I want you to think about our two key words when you investigate 4 new photos. Interdependence means...? Resources means...? Group discussion about how these key words relate to our community. How would communities change if the resources or interdependence change?

Model how you can observe, reflect and question at the same time on the Primary source form, using an ant colony picture. Remember your discussion with each other is how you are going to corroborate and grow your ideas. Be detectives.

### **Active Involvement:**

Independent Practice/Inquiry Group Work/Research

Today while you are observing, reflecting and questioning with your group make sure you really talk about what you notice. If someone says something interesting or scholarly, make sure you write it down to remember it. I will be coming around to hear what your groups are thinking, so that we can share your ideas with the whole class at our closure
